AMCA Program: A Strategic Leap for India's Aerospace Power



01-Jun-25

India's Advanced Medium Combat Aircraft (AMCA) program signifies a strategic leap toward establishing the nation as a formidable global aerospace power. Designed with a two-phase approach, the initiative focuses on indigenizing both fifth and sixth-generation capabilities to significantly enhance the operational effectiveness of the Indian Air Force (IAF) and the Indian Navy. The AMCA Mark 1, which will initially utilize imported engines and current-generation stealth and avionics technologies, is a pivotal step in modernizing India's aging and numerically deficient fighter fleet. This becomes particularly crucial considering that the IAF currently operates below its sanctioned strength of 42 combat squadrons—a shortfall that grows increasingly alarming in the face of advanced threats posed by China's J-20 stealth fighters and its growing regional assertiveness. The more ambitious AMCA Mark 2 is expected to incorporate a suite of next-generation innovations, including an indigenous 110 kN thrust-class engine, AI-enabled avionics, stealth enhancements, and advanced indigenous weapon systems. Among these is the Gandiva air-to-air missile system, alongside future potential for deploying hypersonic missile variants—technologies that could give India a significant edge in air combat and deterrence. These features are aimed not only at improving survivability and lethality but also at enabling the aircraft to operate effectively in multi-domain battle environments of the future. This program is emblematic of India's broader push for self-reliance and technological independence in defense, a policy direction underscored by lessons learned from earlier, often delayed, foreign procurement deals. By reducing dependency on foreign suppliers and fostering domestic innovation, the AMCA initiative reinforces the goals of the Atmanirbhar Bharat (self-reliant India)

vision. Furthermore, the program provides an impetus to the indigenous defense ecosystem, offering opportunities for collaboration with private players, research institutions, and startups, thereby catalyzing aerospace R&D and manufacturing capacity within the country. The successful execution of Operation Sindoor in May 2025, which demonstrated India's aerial and strategic superiority over Pakistan in a rapid-response engagement, has further boosted public and institutional confidence in indigenous airpower capabilities. The operation also served as a timely reminder of the importance of credible aerial deterrence and rapid deployment platforms, reinforcing the urgency of fielding the AMCA within the coming decade. In essence, the AMCA initiative is more than just a platform for bolstering India's air combat strength; it represents a long-term vision to address regional threats from both Pakistan and China, while also enhancing India's standing in the global arena of aerospace innovation. By committing to a future defined by strategic autonomy, self-sufficiency, and technological excellence, the AMCA program is poised to become a cornerstone of India's 21st-century defense architecture.

Indian Army Trials Next-Gen Tech for Enhanced Combat Readiness

The Indian Army is conducting extensive Capacity Development Demonstrations across various locations, including Pokhran and Babina, to evaluate next-generation defence technologies under simulated near-combat conditions. These trials, which include a range of advanced systems like Unmanned Aerial Systems and Electronic Warfare platforms, aim to enhance operational readiness and ensure rapid integration of emerging technologies in line with the Aatmanirbhar Bharat initiative. The participation of numerous domestic manufacturers highlights the growing collaboration between the Army and the Indian defense industry. This initiative marks a crucial step in the Army's roadmap for transformation, reaffirming India's commitment to self-reliance in defense capabilities.

MDL to Sign Deal for Three More Kalvari-Class Submarines

Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Limited (MDL) is set to enhance India's naval prowess by signing a contract for three additional Kalvari-class submarines, valued at approximately ₹38,000 crore (US\$4.5 billion), in June 2025. This initiative aligns with India's Aatmanirbhar Bharat drive, focusing on self-reliance in defense manufacturing and integrating advanced technologies like an indigenous Air Independent Propulsion (AIP) system, significantly increasing operational capabilities. Additionally, MDL has formed a strategic partnership with Hindustan Shipyard Limited (HSL) to expedite submarine development, particularly under Project-75I and Project-76, which aim to bolster India's submarine fleet and reduce reliance on foreign suppliers. This collaboration emphasizes efficient production timelines, leveraging HSL's expertise in hull fabrication while MDL focuses on advanced systems integration. Together, these developments reflect India's commitment to strengthening its maritime capabilities amid growing geopolitical tensions in the Indo-Pacific region, particularly concerning China's maritime expansion and Pakistan's naval assets. The new submarines and enhanced collaboration between MDL and HSL not only bolster India's defense capabilities but also signify a vital step towards establishing a robust domestic defense industrial base, ensuring readiness in safeguarding national interests in the Indian Ocean Region.

India Boosts Defense with Tech, Recruitment, and Integration Efforts

India is enhancing its defense capabilities through Operation Sindoor, focusing on armed forces integration, technological advancements, and large-scale recruitment, with a defense budget of \$81 billion aimed at modernization. The Agnipath recruitment scheme, despite initial opposition, has been successful, with plans to potentially increase retention rates of Agniveers to bolster combat power. With a strong emphasis on joint operations, cyber, and space warfare, India aims to solidify its status among the world's top military powers, supported by initiatives like the National Defence University and extensive training programs. This comprehensive approach not only strengthens military readiness but also offers significant socio-economic opportunities.

UK Invests £1.5 Billion in Six Munitions Factories for Defense Readiness

The UK government is investing £1.5 billion to establish six new munitions factories to enhance military readiness amid rising tensions with Russia and NATO pressures. This initiative aims to address deficiencies in weapon stockpiles, create 1,800 jobs, and increase overall munitions spending to £6 billion by 2029. Critics, however, argue that the plans lack urgency and that procurement should have been prioritized sooner. This strategic shift reflects a broader recognition of the interdependence between a robust defense industry and national security, with the UK government committed to expanding its military capabilities in an increasingly uncertain geopolitical landscape.

Indian Army Inducts TATA's Advanced RCWS for T-72 Tanks

The Indian Army has officially confirmed the induction of the TATA Advanced Systems Limited (TASL) Remote Controlled Weapon Station (RCWS) on T-72M1 Ajeya main battle tanks during a recent visit by Lieutenant General Zubin A Minwalla in Northern Sikkim. This system, equipped with a 12.7 mm heavy machine gun and advanced sensors, significantly enhances the operational capabilities of the T-72, enabling effective engagement at distances up to 4,000 meters. This induction marks a crucial step in modernizing the armored fleet while promoting indigenous defense production, aligning with India's objective to bolster military readiness and reduce dependency on foreign suppliers, particularly in high-altitude terrains.

DRDO to Install Launchers for M1-Interceptor Test Under Project Kusha

The Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) is set to begin the installation of portable launchers and jet deflectors for the M1-interceptor test firing under Project Kusha, aimed at enhancing India's air defense capabilities. This initiative, part of the Extended Range Air Defence System (ERADS), includes a budget of ₹21,700 crore for five squadrons of missiles with a range of 150 km, designed to counter various aerial threats. The M1 missile features advanced guidance and a robust kill probability, filling a crucial gap between existing systems and the advanced Russian S-400. This project reflects India's commitment

to a self-reliant defense strategy and bolstering national security through indigenous technology.

IAF's Jaguar Darin-III to Serve Beyond 2035 with Advanced Upgrades

The Indian Air Force's Jaguar Darin-III aircraft will remain operational beyond 2035, thanks to a life extension program and modern upgrades including the ELM-2052 AESA radar and ASRAAM missile systems. The IAF plans to retire older Jaguar variants by 2029, streamlining its fleet to focus on advanced platforms. Russia's Su-57E for India: Enhanced with Super-30 Integration

L&T Unveils Next-Gen Zorawar Light Tank for High-Altitude Warfare

Larsen & Toubro (L&T), in collaboration with DRDO, has unveiled the second prototype of the Zorawar Light Tank, a significant advancement tailored for high-altitude warfare, particularly in the Ladakh region. Weighing under 25 tons, it is designed to enhance the

Indian Army's operational capabilities, featuring a 105 mm gun and advanced protection systems. The tank's modular design allows for future upgrades, and it is expected to replace older T-72 models, with plans for 354 units by 2030. The Zorawar's capabilities highlight India's commitment to self-reliance in defense, addressing the challenges posed by heavy tanks in mountainous terrains while ensuring agility and firepower.

DMRL Seeks Industry Partnerships for Advanced Aero-Engine Blades SHARE

The Defence Metallurgical Research Laboratory (DMRL) under DRDO is promoting self-reliance in aerospace by inviting industry collaboration for the machining of high-pressure turbine (HPT) blades and vanes made from single-crystal nickel superalloys. This initiative aims to boost India's capabilities in producing critical components for military aircraft engines, reducing reliance on foreign technology while enhancing domestic expertise. DMRL's previous successes include supplying blades for the indigenous Kaveri engine, key to the LCA Tejas. By outsourcing machining, DMRL is advancing indigenous technology, aligning with India's Make in India vision, and addressing strategic challenges posed by dependence on imported aerospace components.

Defense Policy and Budgeting

Government Gains Fiscal Space to Boost Defense Spending SHARE

The Indian government is poised to gain additional fiscal space for defense spending due to favorable fiscal projections for 2025-26, as highlighted in a recent Bank of Baroda report. With a fiscal deficit target of 4.4% of GDP and anticipated nominal GDP growth around 10.1%, the government expects to comfortably meet its revenue targets, aided by an income tax cut and robust capital expenditure. This positive fiscal outlook is crucial in the context of heightened tensions with Pakistan, underscoring the government's commitment to enhancing national security capabilities while maintaining economic stability. Geopolitics and Security Alliances

India Rebutts Sharif's Claims, Citing Pakistan's Terrorism Impact SHARE

In response to a recent terrorist attack, India suspended the treaty, a move criticized by Pakistan's Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif. India's stance underscores its commitment to national security while reaffirming that adherence to the treaty requires goodwill, which Pakistan has not upheld due to its ongoing support for terrorism.

Australian Deputy PM Marles to Boost India Partnership in Indo-Pacific SHARE

Australian Deputy Prime Minister Richard Marles is set to visit India to enhance the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership, emphasizing cooperation in the Indo-Pacific region during his four-day tour starting June 2, 2025. This visit coincides with the fifth anniversary of the partnership and aims to foster discussions on mutual interests and international security. Marles will also engage with leaders in the Maldives, Sri Lanka, and Indonesia to underline Australia's commitment to a secure and prosperous Indo-Pacific, which respects national sovereignty. This heightened cooperation reflects both nations' dedication to regional stability and their shared vision for the Indian Ocean, crucial for countering regional challenges.

China Slams U.S. Defense Chief for Cold War Rhetoric on Threats SHARE

China has responded sharply to U.S. Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth's remarks branding it a threat, accusing him of promoting a Cold War mentality and undermining regional peace. Kharge Calls for Parliamentary Session After CDS Chauhan's Remarks

In recent statements, Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge has called for an immediate special session of Parliament following Chief of Defence Staff General Anil Chauhan's acknowledgment of aircraft losses during the recent military clash with Pakistan. While General Chauhan confirmed that the Indian Air Force (IAF) did experience losses due to tactical errors, he emphasized the importance of understanding the reasons behind these mistakes rather than focusing on the number of jets lost. He firmly dismissed Pakistan's claim of having downed six Indian jets as "absolutely incorrect" and highlighted that all IAF pilots returned safely. In the context of Operation Sindoor, which involved coordinated strikes using advanced missile systems, the IAF successfully targeted several terror camps, achieving its operational objectives despite initial setbacks. Kharge has urged for a comprehensive review of India's defense preparedness, echoing sentiments for strategic improvement akin to the Kargil Review Committee's findings. This calls into question the government's handling of defense communication and strategy, particularly in light of U.S. President Donald Trump's involvement in potential ceasefire discussions, raising concerns about India's diplomatic positioning with Pakistan. Overall, the situation underscores the need for continuous evaluation and enhancement of India's military tactics and readiness in the face of evolving threats.

Army Chief Urges Vigilance and Agility Amid Security Challenges

The integration of ex-servicemen and the determination shown by BSF women troops further reflect the resilience and dedication of Indian defense forces.

Dutch Defence Minister: Chinese Espionage on the Rise in Tech Sector

CPI(M) Criticizes Deportation of Suspected Bangladeshi Infiltrators

The CPI(M) has condemned the push-back and deportation of suspected Bangladeshi infiltrators at the Indo-Bangladesh border, arguing that the government should adhere to legal procedures for handling illegal entrants. They highlight concerns over genuine Indian citizens being wrongfully deported and criticize the Assam government's communal policies, particularly the arming of indigenous people. The BJP countered, asserting that the leftist parties oppose necessary actions against infiltrators for political appeasement, claiming that both CPI(M) and Trinamool Congress support illegal immigration. Military Operations

Ukraine Strikes Deep in Russia with Operation Spider Web

On June 1, 2025, Ukraine launched its most ambitious and far-reaching military operation of the war, codenamed "Operation Spider Web," targeting five Russian airbases deep inside enemy territory. Meticulously planned over 18 months by Ukraine's Security Service (SBU) and supervised by President Zelenskyy, the covert strike utilized drones concealed in wooden sheds mounted on trucks. These mobile platforms were parked near strategic airfields—Belaya in Irkutsk, Dyagilevo in Ryazan, Olenya in Murmansk, Ivanovo Severny, and a site in Voskresensk—before

remotely launching first-person-view drones equipped with AI-guided targeting systems. The drones successfully destroyed or disabled over 40 aircraft, including nuclear-capable Tu-95 and Tu-22M3 bombers, and at least one A-50 early-warning aircraft. This unprecedented strike, reaching over 4,000 kilometers into Russia, demonstrated a sophisticated evolution in Ukrainian drone warfare and dealt an estimated \$2 billion in damage to Russian strategic aviation. Russia confirmed the attacks, admitting that aircraft were damaged and fires were extinguished, and reported the arrest of suspects allegedly aiding the operation. In response, Russia retaliated with its largest drone and missile barrage to date, firing 472 drones and several ballistic and cruise missiles at targets across Ukraine, including major cities like Kyiv, Kharkiv, Odesa, and Dnipro. Ukraine's air defenses intercepted most of the incoming threats—reportedly shooting down over 385 aerial objects—but at least one missile struck a Ukrainian training facility, killing 12 soldiers and wounding dozens more. On the ground, Russia intensified its offensive in the north, claiming the capture of Oleksiivka in the Sumy region and shelling border settlements, prompting Ukrainian evacuations. These military escalations occurred just as Ukrainian Defense Minister Rustem Umerov prepared to lead a delegation to Istanbul for critical peace talks. While Ukraine enters negotiations seeking a ceasefire, prisoner exchanges, and the return of abducted children, Russia continues to press territorial claims and maintain battlefield momentum. The intensifying conflict on both fronts highlights the profound challenges facing diplomacy, as both nations remain deeply entrenched in their strategic aims and the violence shows no signs of abating.

CDS: Operation Sindoor Sets New Standards Against Terrorism

The recent statements by Chief of Defence Staff General Anil Chauhan highlight the strategic significance of Operation Sindoor, where India conducted precision strikes deep into Pakistani territory, demonstrating its military capabilities and resolve against terrorism. Indian Army's "Force One" Exercise Boosts Inter-Agency Security Readiness

Former IAF Chief Bhadauria Rejects Importing 5th Gen Fighters

Former Indian Air Force Chief RKS Bhadauria has firmly rejected the notion of India importing fifth-generation fighter jets in response to Pakistan's potential acquisition of Chinese stealth aircraft like the J-20 or

J-35. He advocates for a unified national effort to expedite the development of India's own Advanced Medium Combat Aircraft (AMCA), emphasizing the need for self-reliance in defense capabilities. Bhadauria acknowledges the temporary advantage Pakistan may gain from these imports but insists that India can counter emerging threats through enhanced air defense strategies, countermeasures, and integrated command systems. He also noted that the recent decision allowing private sector involvement in the AMCA program marks a significant shift towards a collaborative defense manufacturing ecosystem, suggesting that Hindustan Aeronautics Limited (HAL) must adapt to this competitive landscape and collaborate with private firms. Bhadauria's comments reflect a broader commitment to India's Atmanirbhar Bharat (self-reliant India) policy, underscoring the importance of indigenous capabilities over reactive imports. His perspective highlights the importance of strategic foresight, where India should focus on developing advanced technologies and tactics to ensure national security while maintaining a long-term vision for indigenous defense production.

IAF Veteran: India's Losses Don't Compare to Pakistan's Disgrace

Former Indian Air Force pilot Ajay Ahlawat responded to criticisms from Pakistan, emphasizing that while India may have lost jets in recent conflicts, it was Pakistan that ultimately lost face, particularly during India's Operation Sindoor, which involved precise strikes on terrorist infrastructure deep within Pakistani territory. Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan supported this view, confirming that despite aircraft losses, the Indian military adapted quickly and achieved significant operational success. Ahlawat highlighted the effectiveness of India's military response, contrasting it with Pakistan's inability to execute a successful counter-strike, and concluded that India remains strategically positioned, both militarily and economically.

Israel's Strategic Strike: Hamas Leader Sinwar Eliminated in Gaza

In a significant airstrike on May 13, Israel claimed to have eliminated senior Hamas commander Muhammad Sinwar and other leaders in a targeted strike beneath the European Hospital in Khan Younis. Israeli Defense Forces indicated that extensive intelligence was used to mitigate civilian harm, although the strike resulted in

civilian casualties, with reports noting 16 dead and over 70 wounded. This operation is a part of Israel's broader strategy to dismantle Hamas's hierarchy, with Defense Minister Yoav Katz warning remaining leaders of further consequences. The event highlights the complexities of military operations in urban environments, raising concerns over civilian safety amidst military objectives.

BLA Claims Control of Surab City, Targets Key State Installations
